

# Genealogical Focus Areas



# Genealogy Focus Areas

### **Ancestry and family trees**



Built around lineage and lines
Research based on relatives and their descendants
Keyed on vital records (birth, marriage & death)
Not always a lot of context to the basic information
Some people sacrifice quality for quantity



# Genealogy Focus Areas

### **Family History**

Focus on how your descendants lived


Add context to your family tree

Add artifacts to your family tree

Wills, photos, censuses, land records, employment records.

Forensic genealogy (photographic analysis, mapping, etc.)












# Genealogy Focus Areas


### **Social History**







Focus on the social context of your descendants
Research their jobs, where they lived, and their community
Add special history notes to your tree
History books, journals, historical societies, newspapers
Friends, associates, and neighbors (FANs)



### What does your family have that will help your research?





- Photos
- Documents
- Family Bibles
- Newspapers
- Letters
- Wills
- Personal items
- Family Stories
- Deeds
- Etc.



Don't forget the story behind your family's heirlooms or antiques

### **Preserving Family History: Talking with Relatives**

**Start with the Eldest:** Take the time to talk with your older relatives.

Take Notes or Record: Record the discussion for future reference if possible.

Respect Boundaries: Ensure they are comfortable and don't push on topics they may not want to discuss.

Memories Aren't Always Perfect: Remember that memories may not always be completely accurate.



### **Preserving Family History: Start a Journal**

#### **Key Topics to Ask About:**

**Earliest memories** 

Birthplace and childhood home

Family background and relationships

Occupations and education

Immigration or relocation stories

Significant life events

Stories behind photos or heirlooms

There are several interview questionnaires available on the internet.




### Thinking about DNA

#### LOSS OF GREENOCK-BUILT STEAMER AND ALL HANDS.

All hope for the safety of the steamer Falls of Inversnaid has been abandoned, and the vessel may now be looked upon as lost with all on board. She sailed from Newport News for St Lucia and Buenos Ayres, with a cargo of coal, on the 4th of October. Not having been heard of since that date, she was yesterday posted at Lloyd's as missing. The Falls of Inversnaid was a steel screw-steamer of 2,669 tons gross, owned in Glasgow by Messrs Wright, Graham & Co., and commanded by Captain Smith. She was built at Greenock in 1888 by Messrs Russell & Co., and engined by Messrs Rankin & Blackmore.

# Getting Started: Immediate Family

### You Are The First Twig On Your Tree



Start with you\*: Your Story Is Important.

Document your parents, brothers, and sisters Their birthplace, occupations, and other facts.

Then, start your focus on either your immediate paternal or maternal line.

\*If you are adopted or do not know your biological parents then it will be a more complex starting point.

# Getting Started: Working Back in Time

### Your Grandparents




Then choose one of your four grandparent's lines.

You may have some of the information, but now you may need to start seriously researching.

You will quickly learn that some of the information you have been told is incorrect, and some of the family stories simply don't pan out.

# Getting Started: Extended Family

### Grandparents line: their brothers and sisters



# Stepping Back In Time

- Step 1 Immediate & Extended Family
- Step 2 Near Ancestors (up to 200 years ago)
- Step 3 Far Ancestors (between 200 & 400 years ago)
- Step 4 Distant Ancestors (over 400 years ago)

**Each Step Needs Difference Sources and Techniques** 

We will cover Steps 2, 3 & 4 in more detail in class #3

## Common Sources of Information

### There are many sources – these are the main ones

Vital Records: Birth, marriage, and death certificates.

Census Records: Most countries and many states carried out regular censuses.

Church Records: Pre-civil registration, BMD, banns, baptisms, volunteers, and wardens.

**Cemetery and gravestones.** (findagrave.com is an excellent place to start.)

Immigration, Naturalization, and Citizenship. Family groups often traveled together.

Newspapers & Obituaries. There are several sites, so research the newspaper availability first.

Military Records. Generally, records for officers are easier to find than for enlisted men.

Land & Property Records. The Wiki at FamilySearch is an excellent place to start for the next steps by state.

Wills & Probate. Availability varies by location.

Courts, Prisons and Crime. Public records if you can find them.

Maps. Understanding where your family lived helps in other research (friends, associates & neighbors)

Your family. Often, family 'lore' is incorrect but a good starting point for names and relationships.

The Internet offers countless tools and websites for genealogists. I've highlighted a few worth exploring, but always research before subscribing.

Be **cautious** of unsupported or fraudulent sites lurking outside the mainstream.



Not all records are indexed. It is invaluable to beginners and experienced genealogists. The research WiKi will point you in the right direction for deeper research. But the "World Family Tree" may not be correct.
